The duck wanted to help, too.



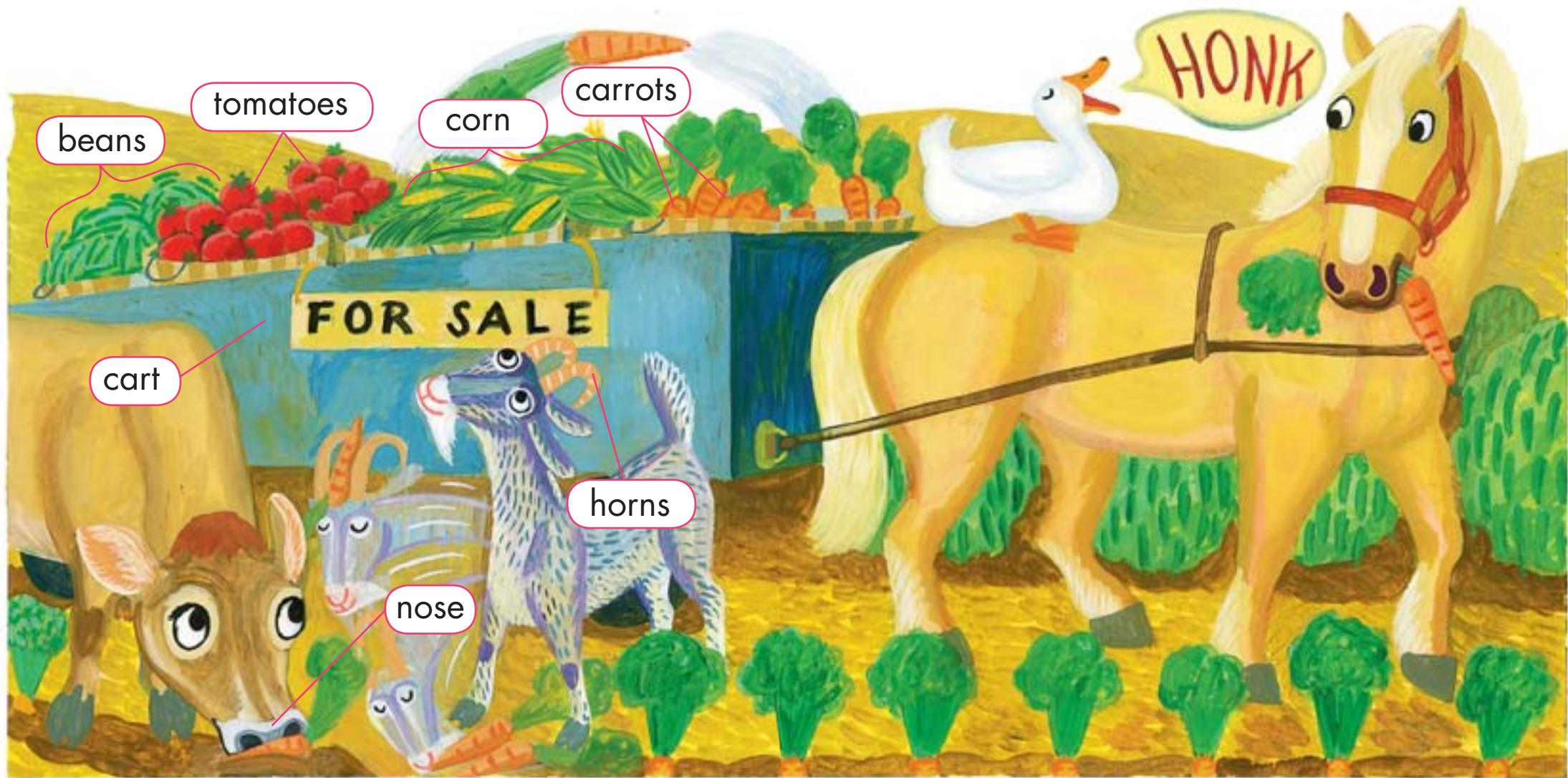


They met in the barn.
