





How a Plant Grows




A plant starts out as a tiny seed. The seed is planted in soil. The seed needs water and sunlight to grow. Soon the seed will grow roots below the ground. A stem will push up through the soil. As the stem grows taller, leaves will appear. The plant may grow flowers too. Inside each flower new seeds grow. These seeds might make new plants.
