

If you were a student in the early days of the United States, that is how your school day might have started.

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
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

Most students today go to schools that are filled with things to help them learn and play. There are books and computers and maps. There are writing pads and pencils and crayons. There are playgrounds and gyms.








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Sometimes students of the past had to go far to get to school. Many walked a long way. Today most students ride school buses or are driven in cars.


