"Bring them all here," said Jake.






Cows came from near and far. The old gardener even brought Bessie back. They lifted her up onto Jake's roof!


Jake sold them at a stand by the side of the road. He and the cows kept the vine under control all summer and into the fall.


Too much kudzu growing too fast can cause problems. Just like in the story, people have found ways to use this fast-growing and plentiful plant!
